**International Indigenous Carbon Forum**

Indigenous people manage or have tenure rights over at least 38 million km<sup>2</sup> in 87 countries on all inhabited continents. This represents over a quarter of the world’s land surface and intersects about 40% of all terrestrial protected areas and ecologically intact landscapes. Although Indigenous people hold considerable land tenure with high conservation and carbon values, disadvantage is still widespread, and it can be argued that policy and programming approaches continue to contribute to a variety of poverties. Carbon farming can protect environmental, social and cultural values of Indigenous people and carbon economies can address Indigenous poverty. In convening Australia’s inaugural International Indigenous Carbon Forum, participants will explore indigenous carbon market leadership, and how this platform can enable further knowledge sharing, commercial interaction and capacity building.
